FROM THE FORMER PRESIDENT



It has been my privilege and my pleasure to work closely with so many of you to grow rowing across Canada.

This has been a year of change for Rowing Canada Aviron (RCA). We began by welcoming a new CEO to lead our organization. Jeff Powell has dedicated time this year to understanding our organization, its people, and both its strengths and weaknesses, giving him a deeper understanding as to what drives us. I look forward to the changes that these insights will bring to move us to the next level.

As we move to the next level, it is vital to expand rowing opportunities for all to keep our sport strong. We must continue to create accessible pathways for anyone interested in rowing, whether for competition or recreation, regardless of age. Also, to support this growth, we must continue to engage individuals as coaches, umpires, administrators, and the many who lend a hand to our sport. As dedicated volunteers manage the rowing support system, offering their time and expertise to enable both competitive and recreational opportunities, it is important that we consistently acknowledge and value their contributions.

Thank you to all who have supported the ongoing development of the National Training Centre. Grants and donations have generated more than \$3 million, making meaningful improvements to the site possible. Like any major project, it has not gone without impediments. Still, we continue to progress in the development of assets to ensure safe and accessible conditions for our National Team members and our aspiring young athletes through camps and training opportunities.

The Canadian sport system is approaching a period of significant transformation. RCA participated in research undertaken by the Future of Sport Commission. The Commission's interim report both highlights and validates longstanding concerns within the system. Among the recommendations is the establishment of a new National Sport Entity (NSE) to provide cohesive national leadership in sport and physical activity as a strategic response to current challenges. The coming years are expected to be pivotal as these recommendations are implemented. RCA will continue to engage to ensure our perspectives are represented as these changes take shape across Canada.

Our solid relationship with World Rowing (WR) enables us to respectfully bring forward matters of concern and be advocates for change. Over the course of this year, Canada has worked closely with 3 other nations on a proposal to change the WR Statutes to increase continental diversity at the Executive Committee level. In September, at this year's WR Congress held in Shanghai, the proposal was overwhelmingly supported by the membership. Also at Congress, our own Dr. Mike Wilkinson was elected as Chair of the WR Sports Medicine Commission. Dr. Mike, along with five other Canadians, serve on WR Commissions and although Tricia Smith has finished her term as Vice President, she will continue as an honorary WR Council Member. Canada is recognized and respected when we speak Congress. Our active participation can continue to be influential.

I will come to a close by reflecting on the past eight years noting that we have successfully navigated the pandemic, created a harmonized safe sport approach, and scaled the Rowing for All program nationwide through the Community Sport for All Initiative (CSAI). Our ability to work together to move something forward was at the

core of each of these successes. We need more of this as we move into the future to continue to grow a strong national sport organization.

Also, I would like to thank the Board members I have worked with over the past 10 years. There is always so much to do and never enough time, but we have been impactful in a positive way.

I also express my appreciation to the RCA staff and their dedication to our sport and our organization. Connecting members to our staff over the years has been a point of pride for me, as their questions and concerns are well received and addressed.

I will continue to fully participate, where needed, in growing rowing across Canada to ensure a solid and bright future for our organization.

ANNUAL REPORT MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

To our Canadian Rowing Community,

I've had the pleasure of meeting and engaging with a number of you over the last several months and look forward to connecting, or reconnecting, with many more in the months ahead. Given the timing of my start, I'd like to spend my time on more of a "State of the Union" and look ahead, rather than a recap of a year gone by.

As many of you will know, Sport in Canada is, as it always seems to be, at a pivotal moment. Funding has not changed across the system in twenty years, meaning NSO's are working with purchasing power that is roughly 50% of what it was. The system we are expected to deliver has only gotten more complicated during that time; with greater and greater unfunded mandates; anti-doping, safe sport, governance and coach education systems are all, properly, much more involved than they were. Clubs and PSO's are feeling the same pressures across the country.

Add to that the particulars of our sport in this time. I think it is no secret that our community has not been as cohesive these last few years as we might like. At a time when unification and shared purpose might have served as a bulwark

against these challenges we, with principled intentions from all, allowed ourselves to take a different path.

And yet, what I have been struck by as I have had the opportunity to visit your clubs and regattas; your boardrooms and Zoom calls; and more coffee discussions than I'm sure are healthy, is a deeply, unwaveringly passionate group of rowers. One of the bits of lore that was passed down at the Winnipeg Rowing Club came from the Riley family; great founders, builders and skilled oarsmen in their own right. The line goes, "there is more to life than rowing....but not much". And I have been struck again and again by how true that seems to be in our community. I can't help but think about what we might do when we settle on a common purpose.

So, what does that mean for all of us as we look forward? As we move towards the delivery of RCA's next strategic plan, I hope you will find common cause with its pillars, and each of you can see yourselves reflected in it. It will require a big ask of our community; but we hope it will deliver big impact; the kind of change that will resonate not just for a quadrennial, but for a generation of Canadian rowers of all levels.

I'd also like to reiterate my own commitment to the community and where I will be spending my time and effort. The four areas of focus for me will be, first, supporting our community cohesion; learning from you what is important and where we share common ground to move forward. Second, working with the High Performance team to drive performance behaviours and resources to the national team. Third, thoughtfully and thoroughly navigate the NTC project to completion; making an honest evaluation of where we stand at every moment of the project, and the costs and benefits to push towards the conclusion. Finally, and this is certainly not unique to RCA, I am committed to building out not just the structures that support fiscal sustainability, but secure the financial resources to put those structures to maximum effect.

I'd like to finish with a couple of "thank you's". First, to many of you. You have repeatedly opened the doors of your clubs, shared your thoughts and wishes for rowing in this country and made me feel very welcome in the role. It has been at times overwhelming but made so much easier with your support and engagement. I am humbled by the opportunity to serve this community, and I hope very much that our organization lives up to

your aspirations for us and that you continue to put your hands up to serve and to counsel as we move forward.

Finally, a word to, and about, my colleagues at Rowing Canada, some of whom I have known since my very first stroke. It has been a deep privilege to work with you these last several months; to learn about what you do and your deep care for it. I can share with you all that there are people here who are among the very best at what they do in sport in Canada. In a system absolutely straining for relief, they are striving greatly to serve you and move the sport forward. In particular, I'd like to single out Jen Fitzpatrick who has been a steady, knowledgeable hand as I have careened about trying to get up to speed. I cannot thank her enough for her guidance these last few months on what seems like a daily basis. We are more fortunate than we may know that she has dedicated herself to our sport, and I want her to know how important she is to our continued success.

ANNUAL REPORT MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER

Fall 2025

The audited financial statements for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2025, were presented to the Membership at the Annual Meeting of Members on September 18, 2025.

The following is a summary of the key points previously reported.

1 RCA received an unqualified, or “clean” audit report. The auditor confirmed that the statements fairly represented our financial position in all material respects. It was also confirmed in the presentation that our internal controls and changes made in our reporting of the NTC Development Project were a positive step.

2 The presentation of the Statement of Financial Position was changed in fiscal 24/25 to reflect the approach to the accounting of the NTC Development Project. RCA has moved to “fund accounting” for this project. This approach is in line with Accounting Standards for Not-for Profit Organizations (ASPNO) and provides better clarity to the membership and transparency of the financial management of the project.

To properly present accurate comparatives, the fiscal 2024 figures were restated accordingly and explained in detail in Note 12 to the statements.

3 It is noted that there are significant variances in the comparative figures for both Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable year over year. The 2025 figures reflect “normalized” levels for the organization. As previously reported, the 2024 figures in both lines were abnormally high due to cash flows related to the 2024 World Championships held in St. Catharines in August 2024.

4 For the year ended March 31, 2025, RCA generated a total net surplus of \$226,523. The previous year (restated) RCA incurred a net loss of \$479,730. The change to fund accounting for the NTC Development Project, the restatement of previous years’ figures and the corresponding adjustments all played a significant role in the generation of the 2025 surplus.

5 As described in Note 7 to the statements as part of the approach to accounting for and reporting on the NTC Development Project, RCA has changed the approach to Deferred Capital Contributions to more accurately reflect the timing of using the contributions for their directed use.

6 As described in Note 14, there was a substantial decrease in domestic “financial” activity as RCA did not receive Community Sport for All Initiative funding in fiscal 2025, whereas RCA received approximately \$1.3 million the previous year.

As indicated in the report to the 2025 Semi-Annual Meeting, we have moved forward with continuing to improve our processes and reporting formats. The “fund accounting “ approach to the NTC Development Project is having the anticipated impact and we will continue with this approach until the project is fully complete.

Interim Unaudited Financial Statements to September 30, 2025

The unaudited interim financial statements for the six months ending September 30 report an operating surplus of \$1,085,600 which is comparable to prior year to date. A projected

operating surplus of \$11,300 is estimated for the 2026 fiscal year which is approximately \$33,000 better than originally budgeted.

The NTC development fund reports a deficit of \$3,999 for the six months ended September 30. Projections for the NTC development fund for fiscal 2026 year end are dependent upon restrictions received on incoming funds which affect the timing for recognition in income. As such a projection is not provided.

The largest variance to budget to date is a reduction in Sport Canada community sport for all funding (\$420K) with the corresponding decrease in the related domestic development expenses.

In addition, with spring funding delays due to the prorogue of parliament, fiscal pressures required reduced camp and event registrations and the associated decrease in expenses. The organization was able to realize a net savings which positively impacted the budget vs projection.

Overall participant registration data for the six month year to date indicates a modest increase in registration over fiscal 2025 despite general economic and funding challenges.

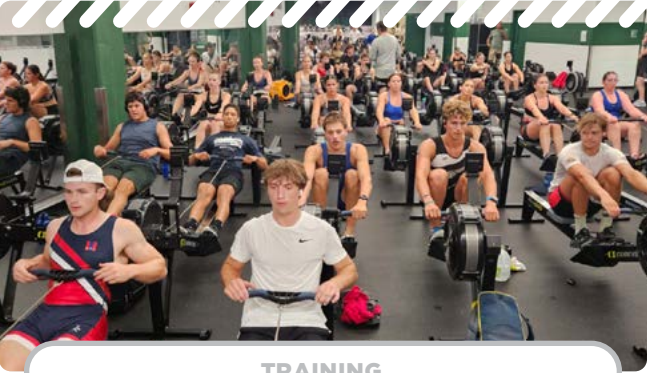

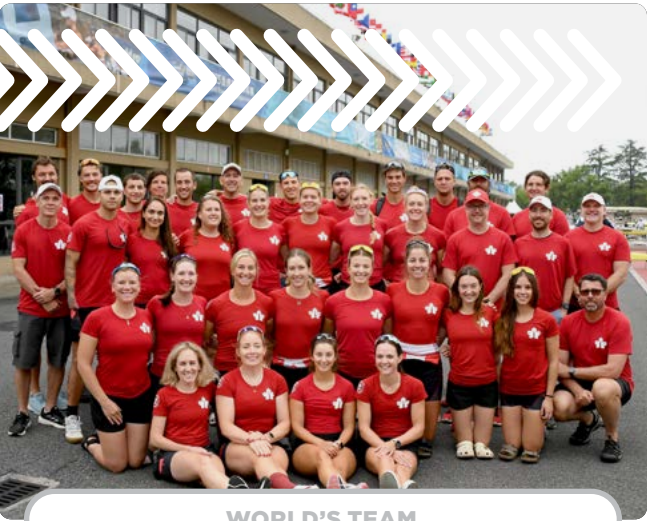

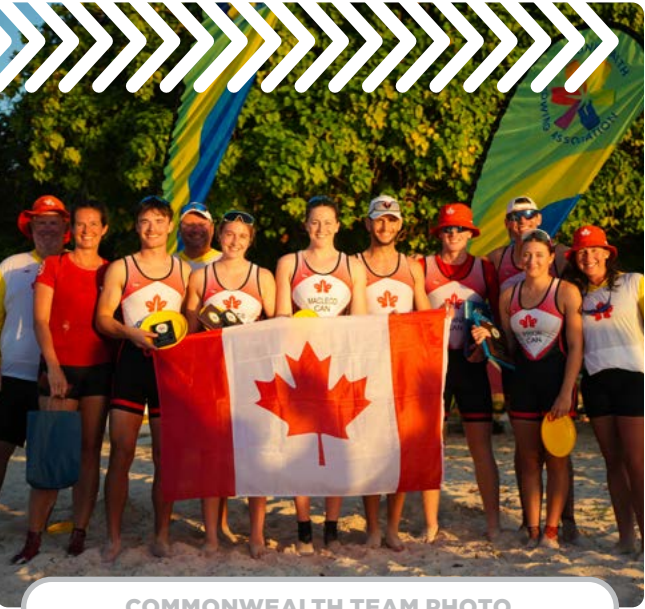

In 2025, several initiatives on the alumni side supported health and wellness while also developing community and enhancing the experience for current athletes.

March saw a Canadian alumni organized group of international athletes at the Heineken Regatta in Amsterdam, where the team covered Olympic quadrennials from Montreal (1976) through Paris (2024). The boat consisted of Canadian, Dutch, French, and Norwegian Olympic medalists. In addition, the Canadian team members were able to sponsor Laura Court to cox and take the crew down the course while strategizing with Paris Olympic gold medal coach Freek Robbers in stroke!

At the same time, over on the community side, Phil Monckton engaged with Michael Carmichael, Agnico Eagle, and the Canadian Rowing Foundation to ensure Paris Olympians and Paralympians received rings in recognition of their commitment and contributions.

Finally, in the fall, there were two events. First, Julien Bahain, Fraser Berkhout, Christian Dabrowski, Ben DeWit and Mark Laidlaw entered a master's four in the open age club event at the Head of the Charles and took home a bronze medal. A little later in the fall, there was fabulous Alumni representation at the Hanlan 50th Anniversary celebration in Toronto.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR’S REPORT

To the members of Canadian Amateur Rowing Association

OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of Canadian Amateur Rowing Association, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2025, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets, and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at March 31, 2025, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

EMPHASIS OF MATTER- RESTATED COMPARATIVE INFORMATION

We draw attention to Note 12 to the financial statements, which explains that certain comparative information presented for the year ended March 31, 2024 has been restated. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

OTHER MATTER- SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

Our audit was conducted for the purposes of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The schedule of governance and national operations, schedule of high performance, and schedule of domestic development on page 17 is presented for purposes of additional information and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information has been subject to the auditing procedures applied only to the extent necessary to express an opinion in the audit of the financial statements taken as a whole.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT AND THOSE CHARGED WITH GOVERNANCE FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association’s ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association’s financial reporting process.

AUDITOR’S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor’s report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association’s internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management’s use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association’s ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor’s report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor’s report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS – YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2025

1. PURPOSE OF THE ASSOCIATION

Rowing Canada Aviron is the operating name of the Canadian Amateur Rowing Association - Association Canadienne d’Aviron Amateur (the “Association”) which is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act. As a not-for-profit organization, the Association is exempt from the payment of income tax.

As a Registered Amateur Athletic Association it is authorized to issue receipts for tax purposes for the donations it receives.

The Association’s principal activity is the development of the sport of rowing in Canada and it is recognized by the Government of Canada and the Canadian Olympic Committee as the national governing body for the sport of rowing.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PRESENTATION:

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (“ASNPO”). As a result these financial statements are in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles (“Canadian GAAP”).

REVENUE RECOGNITION:

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Interest is

recognized on an accrual basis using the effective interest rate method.

Pledges from donors are recorded when payment is received by the Association or the transfer of property is completed. Pledges restricted for future periods are deferred and recognized in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Contributions restricted for capital purposes are recorded as deferred capital contributions when the amount is invested in tangible capital assets and are amortized to revenue on the same basis as the related tangible capital assets are amortized to expense.

Membership fees are recognized as revenue in the period of membership eligibility.

Competition and camp registration fees are recognized in relation to timing of when the various events occur in the year.

FUND ACCOUNTING:

The Operating Fund includes all operating assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses.

The Capital Fund includes all assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses related to the Association’s tangible capital assets.

The Internally Restricted Funds have been designated by the Association for specific uses (Note 10). Internally restricted resources can be made available for other purposes.

The NTC Development Fund is an externally restricted fund representing all assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses related to the development of the National Training Centre (“NTC”) which will serve as the home for Canadian rowing, offering purpose-built facilities, resources and programs to help athletes, coaches, and teams succeed at the highest levels of international competition.

IMPAIRMENT OF LONG-LIVED ASSETS:

The Association tests long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that its carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when the carrying amount of the asset

exceeds the sum of the undiscounted cash flows resulting from its use and eventual disposition. The impairment loss is measured as the amount by which the carrying amount of the long-lived asset exceeds its fair value.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS:

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and balances held with banks.

TANGIBLE CAPITAL ASSETS:

Purchased assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Contributed assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Tangible capital assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis at the following rates:

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS:

The Association considers any contract creating a financial asset, liability or equity instrument as a financial instrument, except in certain limited circumstances. The Association accounts for the following as financial instruments:

- cash and cash equivalents
- trade and other receivables
- accounts payable and accrued liabilities

INITIAL MEASUREMENT

The Association initially measures financial assets and financial liabilities originating, acquired, issued or assumed in arm’s length transactions at fair value.

SUBSEQUENT MEASUREMENT

Financial assets and financial liabilities originating, acquired, issued, or assumed in arm’s length transactions are subsequently measured as follows:

DERECOGNITION

The Association removes financial liabilities, or a portion of, when the obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires.

IMPAIRMENT

Financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost are tested for impairment when indicators of impairment exist at the end of the reporting period. Previously recognized impairment losses are reversed to the extent of the improvement provided the financial asset is not carried at an amount, at the date of the reversal, greater than the amount that would have been the carrying amount had no impairment loss been recognized previously. The amounts of any write-downs or reversals are recognized in net income.

MEASUREMENT UNCERTAINTY:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates. The Association’s material estimates include the collectability of accounts receivable, accrual of accounts payable, useful life of tangible capital asset and amortization of deferred capital contributions.

CONTRIBUTED MATERIALS AND SERVICES:

Donated tangible capital assets and rent are recorded at fair value when received if fair value can be reasonably determined and would have otherwise been purchased.

The Association is dependent on the voluntary service of many members and others. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Association, and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in these financial statements.

5. DEPOSITS

In 2023, the Association paid a \$250,000 deposit towards the development of the National Training Centre at Quamichan Lake on Vancouver Island.

The deposit is held under the terms of a lease agreement with the Quamichan Rowing Foundation and serves as security for the Association's obligations under the lease. The deposit is refundable only if the agreement is terminated under specific conditions. As of March 31, 2025, management has assessed the likelihood of forfeiture as remote. The deposit is classified as a long-term asset and is to be maintained as security for the performance of the Association's obligations under the lease with the Quamichan Rowing Foundation as referenced in Note 13.

7. DEFERRED CAPITAL CONTRIBUTIONS

Deferred capital contributions represent unamortized contributions which have been used to purchase tangible capital assets related to the NTC Development Fund. These contributions will be recognized as revenue in future periods as the related tangible capital assets are amortized.

9. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

Contributions from Sport Canada are subject to periodic audit by Sport Canada. Contributions are refundable to Sport Canada to the extent that any expense has not complied with the agreed terms and conditions. Sport Canada may conduct audits up to 5 years after the end of a reporting period.

10. INTERNALLY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

The Sustainable Organization Reserve Fund provides a source of funds for future financial needs. During the year, nil was transferred to the fund (2024: \$7,243).

11. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Association is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the Association’s risk exposure and concentration as of March 31, 2025.

(A) CREDIT RISK

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Association is exposed to credit risk from members. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based upon factors surrounding the credit risk of specific accounts, historical trends and other information. The Association has a significant number of members which minimizes concentration of credit risk. The credit risk regarding cash and term deposits is considered to be negligible because they are held by a reputable financial institution with an investment grade external credit rating.

(B) LIQUIDITY RISK

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Association is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its funders, members and other related sources, and accounts payable and accrued charges.

(C) MARKET RISK

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The Association is mainly exposed to currency risk.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management’s opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant interest rate risk or other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

(i) CURRENCY RISK

Currency risk is the risk to the Association’s excess of revenue over expenses that arise from fluctuations of foreign exchange rates and the degree of volatility of these rates. The Association is exposed to foreign currency exchange risk on accounts payable held in foreign denominations. The Association does not use derivative instruments to reduce its exposure to foreign currency risk.

12. RESTATEMENT OF PRIOR YEAR FIGURES

During the March 31, 2025 year end, the Association determined that certain adjustments were required to the March 31, 2024 comparative figures for an identified error in the recognition of various capital grants restricted for the purchase of tangible capital assets. The capital grants were inadvertently fully recognized in the 2022, 2023 and 2024 fiscal years and have been adjusted to correctly defer the capital contributions and recognize the revenue on the same basis as the amortization expense related to the underlying tangible capital asset purchased with the funds. Additionally, with the application of fund accounting, the NTC Development Fund was created and corresponding reclassification entries were posted to adopt the appropriate presentation. This has resulted in comparative figures being adjusted to conform with current year presentation. These reclassifications and the adjustment to correct the error described above have been made to the year ended March 31, 2024 figures as follow (see next page):
